## HISTORY—JULY 4TH

Independence Day commemorates the signing of the Declaration of Independence by the Continental Congress on July 4, 1776. At the time of the signing, the 13 colonies were under the rule of England. Prior to this, the colonies experienced growing turmoil due to being forced to pay taxes to England, but they were not given any representation in the English Parliament. In

1774, King George III sent extra troops in hopes to subdue any rebellion. At the same time, the colonies sent delegates to Philadelphia to form the First Continental Congress. In April 1775 as the king's troops advanced on Concord, MA, Paul Revere sounded the alarm that "The British are coming! The British are coming!" as he rode his horse through the streets late at night. The battle of Concord and its "shot heard 'round the world" marked the unofficial beginning of the Revolutionary War. Within weeks, the colonies again sent delegates to the Second Continental Congress. For almost a year, the Congress attempted to resolve its differences with England without formally declaring war. On June 11, 1776, during the Second Continental Congress meeting in Philadelphia, a committee was formed with the purpose of drafting a document stating the colonies would formally sever ties with England. The document was crafted by Thomas Jefferson who was considered to be the strongest and most articulate writer. The final version of the Declaration of Independence was adopted officially on July 4.

On the following day, copies of the Declaration were distributed to the public. On July 6, The Pennsylvania Evening Post became the first newspaper to print the document, and on July 8, the Declaration had its first public reading in Philadelphia's Independence Square to cheering crowds and clanging church bells. Even the Province Bell in Independence Hall was rung to celebrate. The bell was soon renamed the Liberty Bell. Although the signing of the Declaration was not completed until August, the Fourth of July has been accepted as the official anniversary of the United States' independence from England.

**PATRIOTIC DESSERT**

1 cup all-purpose flour

1 cup finely chopped pecans

1/2 cup butter, softened

1 pck. (8oz) cream cheese, softened

1 cup confectioner’s sugar

1 carton (8 oz.) frozen whipped topping  
(thawed & divided)

1—1/2 cups cold milk

1 pck. (5.1 oz.) instant vanilla pudding mix

3 cups fresh strawberries, halved

1/2 cup blueberries

1. In a bowl, combine flour, pecans and butter. Press into an ungreased 13X9 in. baking dish. Bake at 350 degrees for 18-20 minutes. Cool on a wire rack.
2. In a bowl, beat cream cheese and confectioners’ Sugar. Fold in half the whipped topping; spread over crust. In another bowl, whisk milk and pudding mix for 2 minutes. Let stand for 2 minutes or until soft—set.
3. Spread over cream cheese layer. Cover with remaining whipped topping. Decorate with Strawberries and Blueberries to resemble a flag.
