Green Team Update - Try the 30-Day Minimalism Challenge

Ready to make a green resolution? Start with a plan to declutter and minimize your stuff. On day one of the 30-day minimalism challenge, you get rid of one thing, then two things on day two, three things on day three, and so on. By the end of the month, 465 items will be gone from your living space. Search for 30-day minimalism on the internet and you'll find tips to help keep you on track.

Wayne has many options for you to donate or resell your stuff at our local consignment shops, thrift stores, and more. A full list of where to take odds and ends in Wayne is posted on our website at www.cityofwayne.org/greenteam. One person's trash is often another person's treasure!

You can always recycle for **free** at the Wayne Recycling & Trash Center (RTC) at 110 Windom Street and open five days a week: Mon-Wed, Fri, 8am – 2pm, and Sat, 8am – noon (closed Thu and Sun). The center accepts glass, cardboard, tin cans, plastics bottles (no plastic bags or Styrofoam), strings of lights, and scrap metal, and has recycling drop offs for Wayne Boy Scout Troop #174 of aluminum cans, newspapers, magazines, and mixed paper.

Use the City's Brush Pile. Bring your Christmas tree free of any decorations or tinsel to the City's brush pile at 1810 Industrial Road.

Weatherstrip your doors and windows!

Your doors and windows can leak out more heat than you might imagine, but you can put a stop to it by installing weatherstripping around them. Plus, door sweeps help seal the space between the bottom of your door and the door frame.
